Chair's Update

Welcome to the Autumn edition of the Arborfield News. Despite the break in Parish Council meetings in August we have not been idle, this is a short roundup of what your council has been doing in the last three months – if you are interested in joining us to help make Arborfield an even better place to live then please get in touch with me at <u>chair@arborfield.org.uk</u>.

Improvements to Parish owned assets

Following completion of phase one of the **Arborfield Pavilion** refurbishment we have received planning approval for phase two and, after a public tender, have selected the contractor to complete the build. Despite the inclusion of planning conditions (mainly parking and landscaping) we are pleased that we can finally progress the project to deliver a new parish office and changing rooms for sports teams. Completion of this project will bring the parish office back to the heart of the Parish and deliver an expanded, improved pavilion with a significantly lower carbon footprint and a visual enhancement to our beautiful park.

Pound Copse is a much-loved part of Arborfield and a designated Local Wildlife Site. We have recently completed urgent tree work identified by our arboriculturist to remove dead parts of a tree on the boundary. We always endeavour to work with the environment when we have to carry out tree works and in this case we have left the trunk standing as there is evidence that it is being used as a nesting/roosting site. We are also getting costs for replacement of the entry fencing and a rotten bench along the path.

The **Old Churchyard**, while not a Parish Council asset, is the council's responsibility. In agreement with the church we have recently completed the first part of a programme of work moving and securing fallen railings from a tomb, fencing off the tombs which are dangerous and blocking up the entrance to the building. At our meeting in September we approved spend to remove the dangerous sections of the boundary wall where it has been undermined by the mature trees. The wall will be replaced by a fence to keep the site boundary secure. As most of you are aware, the Old Churchyard is in the area that may be included in Wokingham's local plan for a development of 4,500 houses. I would encourage all of you to walk

to the Old Churchyard and experience the tranquility of this area close to the beautiful River Loddon so that you too will be inspired to help the council, and local groups such as SOLVE (Save our Loddon Valley Environment) defend this unique environment against yet another unsustainable housing estate.

The **Coombes woodland** purchase, jointly with Barkham Parish Council, is proceeding through conveyancing and I would expect by the end of the calendar year we will be the owners of 60 acres of this critical habitat that lies between Arborfield and Barkham. Both parishes have allocated CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) money received from developers to this project. We are putting in place a working committee comprising councillors from both parishes who will have delegated powers to manage the woodland for the enjoyment, and education, of everyone in the parishes in perpetuity. We have just completed an arboricultural assessment of the trees close to the paths and I'm pleased that there is only one tree requiring immediate attention which will allow us to phase the other tree works required over a longer period in line with budget availability.

Litter

In late September, I, Councillor Stevens and our Parish Clerk attended the first ever joint Arborfield and Barkham litter pick centred on Arborfield Green and the southern part of the parish. Thanks to the Parish Clerks for organising and publicising the event across the parishes and to the 15 local residents who came out to pick litter.

After almost a year of chasing WBC to clean the litter on Observer Way we have been assured that it will be completed by the end of October. We have, however, been here before with several assurances, which were then missed. So, we will see what happens this time.

You should have seen on local Facebook groups and our website, that WBC are consulting on a significant reduction in litter picking, public litter bins and grass cutting – in fact a reduction in all the services that make the Borough an acceptable place to live. If you haven't already responded to the consultation, which has now closed for the public, please send your comments to parishclerk@arborfield.org.uk and we will consolidate into

the Parish Council response.

Planning

Keeping up with all the planning applications in Arborfield sometimes feels like a full-time job so it is especially satisfying when we see a completely inappropriate application, to which we objected, being withdrawn because the applicant has finally realised that it won't work. This was the case with the absurd plan to put a petrol station and shop on the southern end of Observer Way. I am aware that some people on social media have expressed their frustration at the withdrawal so let me set out the reasons why this was a crazy site for a petrol station: firstly, and most importantly it would set a dangerous precedent for lots of other development all along Observer Way; secondly the proposed entry and exit would have led to completely unacceptable traffic chaos on the Eversley Road between the Langley Common Road roundabout and the Observer Way at the same place that cyclists, pedestrians and horse riders are crossing the road to access the path along Observer Way; finally, an additional store would have taken customers from the Village Shop and the Co-op potentially rendering them unviable which would have been to the detriment of the residents of the parish.

On page 9, Councillor Fox who heads up our planning responses, has set out the planning reasons for objecting to these applications – it always strengthens the case if WBC see the strength of local feeling about applications so I would encourage you all to submit responses and to use the planning reasons we have set out in this Arborfield News. Another completely inappropriate application has been submitted, this time for an industrial estate on the land between Pound Copse and Observer Way. Similar to the petrol station, this proposal also contravenes the same Neighbourhood Plan policies and the Core Strategy – you can see the council's objection on our website, or search using planning application number 223083.

This application would be particularly damaging as it is right next to Pound Copse which is an area of ancient woodland, known bat roost and local wildlife area. along the Reading Road. The Council agreed to write to WBC to support this petition as we recognise the volume of traffic along a narrow lane has become unacceptable. We urge Wokingham to identify the funds to complete this work as soon as possible.

Borough Councillor's Report

After last May's local elections the Lib Dems, supported by Labour, now run the Council. Next May with new boundary changes there will be an all-out election of 54 wards. Arborfield, Barkham and part of Finchampstead will form the new Borough Ward. The Parish Councils will remain the same.

The Lib Dem's Leader, before the election, campaigned against Hall Farm's 4,500 planned houses but once elected he did nothing to reduce these numbers although 2,200 of these houses are not required by the Government within the planning period. As it was the Conservatives who introduced Hall Farm and the 4,500 houses into the new housing local plan and they still support them it would suggest that neither the Lib Dems or the Conservatives care about Arborfield.

The traffic calming scheme continues to be a very sensitive subject which I am still trying to address with very limited progress to date. I also support traffic calming requests on Biggs Lane but once again no progress to date. The Borough Council is looking at changes to California Crossroads which are linked to the additional traffic generation locally. Thanks to pressure from the Parish Council a clean-up of Observer way is planned for the Autumn.

Grass cutting (lack of) and fly tipping continue to be issues that need addressing. Sadly the Borough Council sees reducing the following services as part of their cost cutting exercises: Litter bins, weed spraying, bottle banks storage area cleaning, town centre cleaning, non-town centre cleaning, road sweeping, footpath cleaning, A329M and A33 cleaning and grass cutting. Having put up car parking charges they are also consulting on reducing the existing leisure facilities at St Crispin's Leisure Centre. I have objected very strongly to all of these suggestions/consultations.

I am not looking forward to the state of the Borough, especially Arborfield and its surrounds when the Borough Council cuts back on these services. I notice they do not look at in-house staff economies. They just pick the easy hits like services residents take for granted.

The impact on trees with Tree Preservation Orders in Kelvin Close is ongoing and although the land is not the responsibility of the Borough Council I believe they have a responsibility for the trees' heath. Ending with good news, my thanks to Susan Tyldesley along with all the helpers who got the SHARE scheme up and running in Arborfield. SHARE is operating in Arborfield on Thursdays (PM) at The Royal British Legion. SHARE offers fresh fruit veg and bakery items free of charge to anyone who could do with a bit of extra help food wise.

Just turn up with a bag and a one pound donation, which goes to the registered charity SHARE Wokingham, to help with running costs. No questions asked.

PLANNING ARTICLE

The Parish Council has to be consulted on planning applications but the decision is taken by Wokingham Borough Council as the planning authority.

Our role at the parish is to ensure that we highlight the planning reasons why an application should be supported or rejected. Until the adoption of the new Local Plan Update (delayed by WBC) the planning policies set out in the Arborfield and Barkham Local Plan and the Core Strategy are the policies by which Wokingham has to judge applications. This does not include whether we, or local residents like or want a particular development hence when we submit our responses to applications we focus on whether the application follows or contravenes these key policies.

We will always uphold the Arborfield and Barkham Neighbourhood Plan https://arborfield.org.uk/document-category/neighbourhood-plan/ which was adopted following a local referendum and therefore represents the will of the residents of the two parishes.

A Gem from the History Archives

OUR SCHOOLS – Part 1 THE NATIONAL SCHOOL

This year is the 150th anniversary of our local school, built for the children of Arborfield, Newland and Barkham, which the school will celebrate in November.

Before 1873 there was a National School in Farley Hill Road, now Greensward Lane, opened in 1840 by the National Society for Promoting Religious Education.

The Society was founded on October 16th, 1811. At the founding meeting a statement about educational purpose was recorded: *"That the National Religion should be made the foundation of National Education, and should be the first and chief thing taught to the poor, according to the excellent Liturgy and Catechism by our Church".*

The mission of the Society was to found a Church school in every parish in England and Wales.

NATIONAL SCHOOL

The school was built by voluntary subscription of the gentry and farmers under the fostering care of the Rev. J.W. Hayes – who obtained assistance from the Diocesan Board, Parliamentary Grant, and the National Society

The Master, Mr. Henry Purrell, received 20s. per week (s = shillings) supported by voluntary contributions of the gentry in the neighbourhood.

The school was situated in Farley Hill Road, now known as Greensward Lane, and ceased to be a school in 1873 when the Church of England school was built.

The old school appears to be one of few buildings not pulled down or allowed to decay in the parish and still stands to this day.

As the clocks go back, please leave a light on... and burglars in the dark!

You can make your home look occupied without it costing more

- Close curtains and blinds
- Hide valuables
- Ask a neighbour to park on your drive if you are away
- Make sure your post doesn't pile up
- Empty your bins regularly

You can also

- Try to make your home look occupied by using timer switches on lights and radios.
- Consider purchasing and installing a video doorbell, house alarm or CCTV system.
- Illuminate your front door with dusk to dawn lighting that comes on automatically.
- Always double lock doors and windows when you go to bed.
- Close and double lock all doors and windows when going out, even if you're only away from home for a short period of time. Those 10 or 15 minutes on the school run are all a burglar needs to break into your home.
- Don't advertise you are away from home on social media.
- Keep all valuables and keys out of sight and away from doors, windows and letterboxes and register your valuables with www.immobilise.com
- When not in use, store electronic car key fobs in a security pouch to prevent them being scanned by thieves to open and steal your car.

When working from home, ensure laptops and electronic equipment are not on view. Don't give thieves the tools to burgle your house, ensure sheds and garages are locked and secure.


